NAIDOC WEEK BY TYLER MCDONALD

From the 7th of July to the 14th NAIDOC week occurs.

NAIDOC week is a way to acknowledge that we are living on Indigenous land and to pay respect to the tribes and culture. Our school this year acknowledged the Indigenous by holding an assembly. Three students ran the assembly and were able to to talk about their culture and background. My name is Tyler and I was lucky enough to be a part of this assembly and I got to talk about my tribe and culture.

My tribe is the Yuin and we are located on the South East coast of NSW. During this assembly I was able to perform some animal sounds through the didgeridoo. The didgeridoo is originally made from old eucalyptus trees that have been hollowed out by termites. After collecting the eucalyptus trees, beeswax is usually added to the top of the trunk to make it easier to play. You can play the didgeridoo by vibrating your lips tight and loose to create the drone sound.

In my tribe I was raised to learn about how we lived and how to survive. I was lucky enough to have my nan and dad teach me. My great grandfather's name was Gubbo Tedd Thomas and he is all over the internet if you are interested in learning more about him. You can search him up then add wikipedia to the end that will give you all the information about him.

Our adventure began with a scenic hour-and-a-half drive to EcoLink. Upon arrival, we were warmly greeted by the staff, who introduced themselves before guiding us through their workshop. The tour concluded in a room where we each received notebooks, learning about the organisms and plant life we would encounter that day. Soon after, we ventured to a nearby lake, examining its surroundings and carefully assessing its cleanliness by filling out observation charts. After completing our worksheets, we returned to a picturesque picnic area for a well-deserved snack, adjacent to a spacious field where our class engaged in ball games. Back indoors, the staff presented us with water samples collected from outside, which we eagerly studied under microscopes, identifying various invertebrates. Afterward, we ventured back outside to explore another lake within the garden, taking turns fishing with bottles, collecting water samples. Following these outdoor activities, we regrouped in a laboratory, organizing ourselves into teams of four. Two tables examined the outdoor water samples, while the other two focused on the garden ones. We were excited to utilize new equipment, including a gadget that measured water quality. Upon completing our experiments, we compared results and discovered that the indoor water was significantly cleaner and more environmentally friendly than the outdoor samples. Following our discoveries, we enjoyed lunch and re-entered in the classroom, where we delved into the intricacies of the food chain. Understanding its fragility, we realized how disruptions at any level can impact the entire ecosystem. Each of us shared our findings before boarding the bus and returning to school, reflecting on our enriching experience at EcoLink.


Premier's Reading Challenge
