RAMADAN: Almira Hafiz 7E

Fasting is a very important part in Islamic culture. Fasting happens during Ramadan. Ramadan is the 9th month of the islamic calendar and is one of the most sacred ones. People celebrate Ramadan because it is the time where the first words of the Holy Qur'an were revealed to the Prophet Muhammad (sallallahu alayhi wa sallam). To understand how Ramadan became such an important part of Islam, we need to go back to the very beginning, 610 A.D., to be precise. This is the year during which prophet Muhammad see meditated in the cave of Hira, located in the Jabal an-Nour mountain close to Mecca. Whilst he was meditating, Muhammad saw was visited by the angel Jibril who revealed the first words of what would later be known as the Qur'an. The angel told Muhammad ﷺ that these words came directly from Allah and that He is the one and only God. Fast forwarding to now, over 2 billion people celebrate Ramadan and its significance. The last 10 days of Ramadan are the most important and sacred days of the month. Laylat ul-Qadr or the Night of Power and is considered to be the Islamic calendar's holiest eve. During this night, Angel Jibril (Gabriel) revealed the Holy Qur'an's first verses to the Prophet Muhammad . This night falls within Ramadan's final 10 days, and although the exact date is unidentified, it is commonly thought of as the 27th day of Ramadan. Eid - al Fitr or Eid is a celebration to mark the end of Ramadan. During Eid we usually make delicious sweets and wear Islamic clothes.

Personally my favourite part of Eid is celebrating with my family and eating all of the delicious sweets. Eid traditionally lasts 3 days and is wildly known as the celebration for finishing the last 10 days of ramadan. Some of the goals of fasting are to draw closer to Allah, reconnect with the Qur'an, increase in will power and self control, feel compassion for others, increase in generosity and charitable giving.
